

DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES WORKER - ALTERNATE DELIVERY (DSAD)

Ontario College Diploma | 4 semesters | Barrydowne

As a Developmental Services Professional, you are embarking on a rewarding career by supporting children and/or adults experiencing life with a disability - without having to leave your home community.

The Developmental Services Worker – Alternate Delivery program is delivered as a combination of virtual video instruction, online courses, and field placement; a great option if you require flexibility in your College schedule.

As a Developmental Services Professional, you will learn how to effectively develop a person centered approach to support an individual's emotional, mental, physical, and/or social needs. Autism Spectrum Disorders, Down Syndrome, and Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders are examples of the content you will study in the program. You will learn about the stages of human development, the diversity associated with developmental and intellectual disabilities, and the range of community supports for children and adults. In addition, you will learn to work within the legislative frameworks governing the Developmental Services Sector as it relates to prevention and intervention techniques, person-centered planning, dual diagnosis, basic nursing, pharmacology, alternate forms of communication, and the constructing of a safe, respectful, and dignified life. You will develop advocacy skills through relationship building and the critical thinking skills required to support people who experience life with disabilities.

In-class learning will be complemented by extensive hands-on experience gained through four block placements, beginning with a placement in semester two, and continuing with placements in semesters three and four.

You will gain the following skill sets from this program:

- Communication using alternate communication systems: sign language and a picture exchange communication system
- Administration of medications and basic nursing care
- Advocacy for supports and services
- Creation of effective informal and formal person centered plans
- Creation of positive behaviour support plans and positive intervention and instructional strategies
- Supporting individuals across the diverse spectrum of disabilities
- Helping those experiencing life with a disability to integrate into the community
- Working collaboratively with families and community professionals

Program Highlights

- 2 years - 4 semesters
- Complete all course work and field placements in your home community
- Field Placement opportunities in semester two, three, and four
- Small classes taught by industry experts who are active in the field

- Hands-on experience in advocacy, report writing, developing informal and formal strategies for individuals experiencing life with disabilities, crisis management, and much more
- Opportunities for summer and/or part-time employment with local agencies
- Certification in Non-violent Crisis Intervention and Prevention
- Fast-track option may be available through the Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR) process and/or Advanced Standing if you have related work experience or a related diploma/degree.

Fieldwork/Placement

Prior to the first field placement in second semester, students will be required to complete the following:

- Two-step TB test
- Hepatitis B Immunization
- First Aid Certification
- Criminal Record Check – vulnerable persons check
- Record of up-to-date immunizations
- Obtain a note from a physician indicating freedom from communicable diseases

Please note:

- Some field placement sites may require an influenza shot and / or a Respiratory Mask Fit Test
- Students with a positive criminal records check may be refused placement by agencies and school boards
- Criminal records checks must be current for 3-6 months for each placement block. Placement agencies determine these timelines
- Many adult sector positions require a valid Class G driver's license

Admission Requirements

For graduates of the new curriculum (OSS): Ontario Secondary School Diploma (30 credits) or equivalent or mature student status, including:

- Any grade 12 English (C), (U), or (M)

Recommended:

- Computer competency in relevant software
- Any grade 11 mathematics (C), (U), or (M)
- Any biology (C), (U), or (M)
- A valid driver's license
- Volunteer work/co-op placement in a related area

Additional Requirements

- First Aid and CPR certification prior to the second semester placement

- Ability to participate in Non-violent Crisis Intervention Training
- Non-violent Crisis Intervention prior to the fourth semester placement
- An up-to-date criminal record check is required prior to all field placements. Agencies may not accept students with a positive criminal record check.
- Ability to assist individuals living life with disabilities in all aspects of daily living as required, including lifting and transferring
- Up-to-date medical
